
GRATITUDE REPORT





Now I am learning many things that I never thought of before. I can now work some projects on the computer and more or less I am becoming good at controlling the sewing machines.


I am very grateful to our benefactors for their spiritual and financial help. They are truly part of the fulfillment of our dreams in life.

Mexico

In Mexico, nearly half of the population lives in poverty. With poor living conditions, lack of proper nutrition, and quality education inaccessible, the cycle of poverty persists.

The Sisters of Mary programs provide a safe place to live and learn for 5,000 children, where they are lovingly cared for and have the chance to enjoy a childhood free from the worries of poverty.







Philippines

In the Philippines, poverty afflicts more than a fifth of the total population and **children are disproportionally affected by these living conditions**. Many children are living in slums and their basic human needs, such as clean water and clothing, are not being met. Without access to education, the cycle of poverty continues, with little hope for a bright future for these children.

With the help of our donors, the Sisters of Mary are able to provide care for over 10,000 of the poorest children in the Philippines. The Sisters of Mary operate and maintain 4 schools in the Philippines: Biga Girlstown, Adlas Boystown, Talisay Girlstown, and Minglanilla Boystown. These schools provide an education, a safe place for children to grow up, and the priceless gift of hope for a better life.

My name is Bukhari. My father is farmer and my mother is housewife. I am currently studying at the Sisters of Mary School-Adlas.

My life outside before I entered here in the Sisters of Mary School was very hard, for my family is included in the impoverished unit of the society– in short, we are poor. 

Tanzania

The Sisters of Mary started operations in Tanzania with their Kisarawe Girlstown in 2019 and have since expanded their programs in this East African country.

In 2022, the Sisters of Mary opened Kiluvya Nursery and Training Center, a multi-purpose facility providing Montessori style nursery care for 90 young children and certified training for 110 impoverished women who have dropped out of education.

In response to the pleas of the community, the Sisters have plans to open up a Boystown in Dodoma. On December 9th, 2022, the Sisters were able to hold a groundbreaking ceremony to officially open the building project.

Education is inaccessible to about 40% of Tanzanian children and without quality education, these children are left vulnerable to the devastating effects of poverty. The work the Sisters of Mary do in Tanzania is changing lives and it is only possible through the generosity of our donors.









Honduras is one of the poorest countries in Latin America with over half the population living in **poverty**. There is little access to quality education and many children are pulled away from school to work to provide for their family.

With the funds from our gracious donors, the Sisters of Mary are able to operate two schools in Honduras; Tegucigalpa Girlstown and Amarateca Boystown. The over 1,500 children at the schools in Honduras come from the most remote and impoverished regions in the country.

The Sisters of Mary prioritize vocational training for the students so they are equipped with skills and trades to gain employment once they graduate. This year, they were able to start construction of a dressmaking workshop at Tegucigalpa to expand the vocational training for the girls.



Yordin in His Own Words

Since my parents do not have money to send me to school, they didn't send me to school for about two years. Within these years, I dedicated to work in the farm together with my parents and to help my 2 elder brothers study. I am the third child of seven. My parents are working hard yet our family does not improve economically.

My first day at the Sisters of Mary was full of emotion, having curiosity all throughout the compound. My heart was so happy having a new opportunity to study.


What I like most here is the organization of everything. On how everything goes well. I like our beautiful garden and when all of us sing in the gymnasium.

My name is Daily. When I was six years old I entered school in pre-primary. I was very excited to learn new things. Studying for me was a motivation. One day when I went to church there I heard the notice that there was a school called "Villa de las Niñas" that helped young people who wanted to move forward. The first requirement is to take an exam to enter the institution. I asked my mom for permission to take the exam, she accepted. The exam was done by video call. Then I called to ask if I had won and the answer was yes. I was very excited and I thanked God for the opportunity and now that I am here I am fighting to improve in my studies and I am also asking God for wisdom and I know that with the help of him I will be able to achieve it.

Guatemala has one of the highest poverty rates in Latin America and many children are left neglected and malnourished. In rural areas, where the poverty is the greatest, children start working at a young age and they lack access to basic health care and sanitation.


Thanks to our generous donors, the Sisters of Mary are able to care for 2,100 children at Zona 6 Boystown and Zona 13 Girlstown. At these schools children receive educational and vocational training to give them hope of a promising future.

These poor children come to the Sisters with nothing but once they enter the Sisters" care, every child has all the food, clothes and educational supplies they need to have a proper childhood away from the harmful effects of poverty.

Fully Alive

CHALCO, Mexico - The I AM the Vine Foundation provided catalyst funds for a new building project and endowment fund in Mexico after a visit to the Sisters of Mary Girlstown in Chalco, Mexico. The funds come as a \$3 million matching grant to support the children experiencing poverty in Mexico. Half of the \$3 million match will be used to support a new arts and vocational workshop building on the Chalco Girlstown campus named *Fully Alive*. The other half of the funds will match contributions to an endowment to help sustain operations long-term at Chalco Girlstown.

In response to the matching gift challenge, the Craft Family Foundation matched the entire \$1.5 million to build the art and vocational workshop building on the Chalco Girlstown campus. Construction has already commenced, and the building should be completed by late summer of 2023.

On the heels of the combined \$3 million gift to complete the workshop building, the Stella Park Foundation aka Shema Foundation contributed \$1 million to be used for the Fully Alive Endowment Fund and scholarship resources for the girls, which benefit the Sisters of Mary's long-term charitable work in Mexico.

This incredible giving will help transform generations of girls in Mexico!

Nearly **50% of graduates** from the Sisters of Mary program in Mexico have gone on to receive a college degree, far surpassing the general population rate of 20% with a college degree. **Over 96% of graduates** report being able to make a living for themselves and their families with the skills they learned at the Sisters of Mary School.
